

Parish Council Updates

A big "Thank You" to our volunteers!

Volunteers contribute many hours to maintaining and enhancing our open spaces in the parish so we would like to take this opportunity to say a heartfelt thanks all you for your continued support. Whether you have helped us with planting, digging, growing, cutting, litter-picking or watering – Thank You!

The wildflower beds planted out last spring in our managed open spaces are now wellestablished. This year, with seeds supplied by the parish council and successfully grown on by residents, additional mini wildflower beds have been created alongside the wooden bollards at Daintree Green and Vicarage Fields.





Creating more native species wildflower areas in our managed green spaces not only provides an excellent source of nectar for bees and other insect pollinators to feed on, but also provides a beautiful and colourful display throughout May to October, great for our mental well-being and pride in our community. We'd also like thank those residents who supported the annual No Mow May campaign by leaving their lawns and/or verges uncut as part of the national campaign to boost biodiversity.

The annual Community Litter Pick took place during the Great British Spring Clean 23 campaign and was well supported. Over 15 bags of rubbish were collected in 2 hours, with a special blitz concentrated on clearing ditches, hedges, verges and undergrowth of discarded bottles, cans, fast food containers, etc., (See examples of rubbish collected from Marsh Lane ditches). Special thanks also go to those people who regularly litter pick around the parish independently throughout the year.



Surplus Wildflowers

The Parish Council would like to offer residents spare wildflower plants grown by volunteers to start mini wildflower beds on the verges outside of their properties*.



Plug plants available include Borage, Ox-eye daisies, Wild Carrot, Common Bird's Foot Trefoil, Salad Burnet and Red Clover.

If needed, volunteers could remove a 12inch/30cm square of turf to enable residents to start their project. Plants available until 30 June 2023 or while stocks last.

Please look outside today!

Do you have to walk along the road or path outside your garden, helping someone who is infirm or with a child in a pushchair? If not you might be surprised at how narrow the path is or how overhanging vegetation obstructs your progress. Please help us all by keeping your hedges trimmed - especially if the road is busy or if it is on a blind corner. Thank you. Footpaths are to keep people safe and they need to be kept clear at all times. **Your hedges are your responsibility!**



20mph bin stickers



Following a successful implementation of the 20mph zone across the village, the Parish Council have purchased an initial 100 20mph bin stickers. If any residents living on the main roads through the village would like some, please contact Cllr Robin Waters (see back page for contact details).

Road safety measures resulting in reduced speeds

Initial analysis of the speed data collected by the Parish Council's speed sign following the implementation of the 20mph zone through the village shows that it has resulted in a reduction in speeds on Hemingford Road.

When comparing speeds pre and post implementation, we can see that there has been a significant increase in cars travelling at 25mph or below with 60% of cars now traveling in this bracket, and 88% cars now travelling at less than 30 mph. We are some way off the majority travelling at the new speed limit but thank those of you who have been keeping to it. We expect that as motorists get used to the new limit, we will see further reductions in average speed.



We will continue to monitor the impact these changes are making to road safety across the village and will be moving the speed sign to different locations throughout the year.

It could be you!

The Parish Council currently has a number of vacancies for Councillors. Could one of them, be you?

Being a Parish Councillor gives you the opportunity to play a key role in the



decisions that affect life in our village and to make a positive contribution to the many areas of work the Parish Council is involved in.

If you're interested in becoming a parish Councillor, the first step would be to attend one or more of our meetings as an observer, or to get in touch with one of our existing Councillors or Clerk who can explain what's involved. Being a Parish Councillor is a part-time commitment that many of our Councillors manage around full or part-time jobs, family and other commitments.

If you think you fit the bill and you have some time to spare, then please do get in touch.

Planning committee matters

The Parish Council has no direct planning powers but is consulted by, and can make representations to, Huntingdonshire District Council (HDC). It is HDC's responsibility to inform neighbours of planning applications. Residents are urged to make their own comments on the HDC website. Councillors will usually call on the applicant and relevant neighbours to explain how the council considers applications and how residents can make their views known to the parish council and to HDC. The next Planning Committee meeting will be at 7pm on Monday June 12th in the Reading Room, High Street.

Our 2022/23 season is now over. Wild Honey Bee Survey by Philip Turon

The Cambridgeshire honey bee population consists of those in managed colonies and others that exist in locations that the bees have discovered for themselves. These wild bees are probably descended from swarms from managed colonies which have escaped despite the best intentions of fellow bee keepers. We have no idea of the size and condition of these feral bees and so are looking to locate as many of as possible. Although there have been similar studies we do not believe that there has been one attempted on this scale and certainly not in Cambridgeshire.

Once we have built a map of the wild bee colonies we would like to track them over the long term with the help of our members. We will be looking at how long the colony survives, the type of preferred site and whether the swarm was seen arriving.

Marsh Lane fishing lakes walking permits

Why not visit the Marsh Lane lakes and see what they have to offer. There is an abundance of flora and fauna, including many species of birds and waterfowl. However, you will need a walking permit which can be obtained from the London Anglers Association. The fee is £8 per household, per annum, renewable every 16th June (there is no pro-rata rate) and you must be a resident of the Parish of Hemingford Grey.

Permit holders can take their visitors with paths open from sunrise to sunset. Certain rules apply, a full list of T&C's is on the application form.

The walking permit does not entitle the holders or their visitors to fish. Fishing permits are issued by the London Anglers Association.
